

You're wheely going to love this month's highlighted item—shopping cards. When it comes to learning, this toy has it in the bag.

- Use carts as a vehicle to help little ones move from crawling to walking.
- **Provide sensory input** through movement and resistance created by pushing carts.
- Develop coordination while navigating the environment (e.g. Avoid hitting a wall by maneuvering around obstacles/reach up high on shelves, squat low.).
- Follow directions. ("Go around the table, then put the apple in the cart.")
- **Build vocabulary** and community helper awareness playing I Spy. ("I spy something yellow." "I spy someone packing bags.")
- Address early math skills with money, aisle numbers, comparing length/weight of items ("Which fruit is heavier?").
- **Enhance auditory memory** ("Find a fruit that is red, round, and crunchy.").
- Develop reading skills by matching the words from labels to your list.

Peel stickers and place them on items

checked off from grocery lists to build fine motor skills.

Borrow our shopping carts, grocery items or dolls and let kids pretend they are shopping at home or take a cart to your local grocery store for some hands-on learning!
