

Why should I consider Low Vision Services?

What is low vision?

- Low vision refers to reduced vision which is not correctable with glasses, medical treatment or surgery and impairs function.
- A person who has low vision may have blurred vision, tunnel vision, blind spots or a combination of these symptoms.

How can a low vision exam help?

- A low vision exam may include assessment of magnifiers, telescopes, special lighting, video-magnifiers or specialized glasses.
- Training, information and resources are provided to help patients remain active and independent.
